The PTRC — as the administrative arm and public image of the Mumbai Chapter, Indian Psychoanalytical Society — is putting forth in this Newsletter all the activities of the Mumbai Chapter, that have taken place from July 2019 - March 2023.

Our last newsletter was published in July 2019 and described our growth across schools and outreach work along with the opening of a new clinic in Churchgate and a thriving and expanding training and student body. In January 2020 the first cases of COVID were detected in India and on March 20th we closed our clinics and shifted to working online. The lockdown came into effect on 25th March 2020.

Across the country millions of people who lost their livelihoods and ways of subsistence overnight, were forced to find their way home from the larger cities in lockdown. It was a sobering and frightening time of increasing uncertainty and we were grateful for what technology enabled us to do. Schools and workplaces were shut leaving families in close quarters, in many cases reinforcing emotional difficulties that might otherwise have been getting managed by creation of physical space.

At PTRC via the school work and in our clinics, we see children, parents, and adults across the socioeconomic spectrum. During this time, our therapists tried to continue this work through video calls on telephones and computers. Multiple issues arose: an absence of privacy as there were families who live in single rooms; the reality of only one phone in the family that couldn't be spared for sessions. Therapists had to try and see what was, or was not, possible to provide under very difficult circumstances.

Soon after the lockdown began, by April 2020, PTRC organised, and was able to offer, free online sessions. This received a substantial response. Some of our therapists are still working with individuals who started with free sessions and later converted to regular patients.

Towards the end of 2021 and the start of 2022 people began to slowly return to work in person. Our clinics reopened, and therapists worked online from clinics even if patients were not willing to return as yet. Now as we are well into 2023, we are dealing with the challenges of returning to working in person. While working virtually is no doubt useful when in-person work is not possible, it simply is not the most effective form of therapy. While most people realise this through their experience, some find it more difficult, especially given the external realities of travel and work in a city like Mumbai.

This, our first post-pandemic newsletter, is full of our activities across the clinics, schools and training, along with PTRC's outreach work, particularly through senior members, across national and international associations and platforms. One of the most vibrant programmes being run by the Mumbai Chapter is the Continuing Professional Development (CPD). CPD was first initiated by Mrs. Minnie Dastur (Senior Training and Supervising Analyst) with film analysis and discussion on 'Black Swan' in the year 2010. The idea was to expand our own repertoire of knowledge, through connections to literature, art, music and poetry; to continuously enrich the imagination and allow us the space to wander in reverie and find what might help us to understand and connect better with our patients. Currently, CPD events run nearly every month. CPD welcomes contributions from our members on any subject that falls under this purview.

All the activities reflect the interest and pleasure taken in our work, and how it sustains us in the face of difficulty, and how much we value being able to come together again.

#### **ACTIVITIES**

### From March 2019 onwards

Ms. Gill Ingall conducts a clinical seminar group once a month for our clinical training students. This is organised by the Melanie Klein Trust and is offered free to our students.

**Ms. Gill Ingall** is a senior Child and Adolescent Analyst and a Psychoanalyst from the British Psychoanalytic Society.

### 22<sup>nd</sup> February 2020

Under the aegis of the CPD Cell (comprising Mrs. Minnie Dastur, Mrs. Zarine D'Monte, Ms. Banu Ismail and Ms. Gouri Salvi), regular presentations by both faculty and students, help members keep up with new thinking in the field and broaden the understanding of psychoanalytic ideas through the medium of the arts, cinema, culture, literature, etc. – helping us to creatively expand and deepen our thinking.

As part of the CPD programme, the American psychological thriller film, Joker was screened for PTRC members and their guests. As evident in the discussion that followed, viewing the film through a psychoanalytic lens led to a rich and evolving discussion regarding the characters, their motivations and so on. It certainly gave us a way to study human nature and psyche, and further our understanding of the same.

### **April 2020**

A month into the lockdown, we had to concede to the new normal. Training Analyst, Psychologist and Child Analyst, Ms. Banu Ismail conducted a session on "Understanding the challenges of the current lockdown situation" for the staff members of SNDT via Zoom, reflecting the need of the hour and what people were having to cope with at the time.

### 26<sup>th</sup> May to 29<sup>th</sup> May 2020

Mrs. Minnie Dastur organised a four-day online seminar, conducted by Ms. Margaret Rustin, Dr. Jan Abram, Dr. Bob Hinshelwood & Ms. Gianna Williams. The seminars were eagerly received and saw our students present their clinical presentations.

**Margaret Rustin:** Margaret Rustin is one of the key figures in establishing the Tavistock and Portman

Clinic as a major provider of education and training in the NHS. She has been a Chair of the Professional Committee and Dean and an Executive Director during her long career at the Tavi.

Jan Abram: Jan Abram is a training analyst and fellow of the British Psychoanalytical Society (BPAS). Alongside her private clinical practice, she is Visiting Professor of the Psychoanalysis Unit at University College London (UCL), where she is a course convenor and lecturer for the MSc in Theoretical Psychoanalytic Studies. She is also on the board of the International Journal of Psychoanalysis. As a leading scholar of D. W. Winnicott's theory, Ms. Abram has travelled all over the world, and has published several books examining and elucidating his ideas.

Prof. Robert Hinshelwood: Fellow of the British Psychoanalytic Society and Fellow Royal College of Psychiatrists, Prof. Hinshelwood has been a prolific writer for the last 35 years. His wide-ranging work covers clinical and theoretical psychoanalysis as well as the application of psychoanalytic thinking to other fields, especially groups, organisations and social science. He has also been a passionate teacher and scholar of psychoanalysis, most prominently as Professor for Psychoanalysis at the University of Essex.

Gianna Williams: Gianna Williams trained as a child and adult therapist and was part of the teaching staff of the Tavistock Clinic in the 1970s and later Consultant Psychotherapist at the Adolescent Department of the Tavistock, where in 1987 she founded the Eating Disorders Workshop. She has taught at the Tavistock Clinic and University of East London, and the Universities of Pisa and Bologna and has founded numerous courses based on the Tavistock model in Italy, France and Latin America.

### 7<sup>th</sup> June 2020

Ms. Banu Ismail held a session on Understanding Children's Emotions for parents of the Wisdom International School, Jamshedpur via Zoom – the online platform allowing the provision for much needed support to those who could not access it in person or from where they were geographically located.

### 17<sup>th</sup>July 2020

Many of us attended the IPA (International Psychoanalytical Association) webinar on Schooling During Covid Lockdown and Beyond. Senior Training and Supervising Analyst Mrs. Minnie Dastur was a panelist on the webinar.

### 15<sup>th</sup> August 2020

Mrs. Minnie Dastur held a seminar on "Working online - the new setting" to address some of the concerns and challenges of online therapy & analysis, and to help us see opportunities for understanding our patients in them. Child Psychoanalyst, Ms. Abha Shah presented her Clinical Case to help us reflect over the 'new setting'.

### 6<sup>th</sup> September 2020

Following the August seminar, Mrs. Minnie Dastur held an open seminar on the use of the online medium and its subtle influence on both the analyst and analysand. Several analysts and students shared vignettes from their clinical work which was discussed and helped us to continue to further our understanding of the new setting.

### 7<sup>th</sup> November 2020

Ms. Priscilla Roth conducted an online Clinical Workshop. Psychoanalyst and Training Analyst Mrs. Micky Bhatia was the Moderator. The workshop was organised by Mr. Sarosh Forbes, Senior Training and Supervising Analyst. Psychoanalysts and Training Analysts Ms. Nuzhat Khan and Ms. Banu Ismail presented their papers.

Priscilla Roth: Priscilla Roth is a training and supervising analyst with the British Psychoanalytical Society. Following her degree in psychology at Berkeley, she worked as a research assistant at the University of California at Berkeley. In the early 1970s she moved to the UK and trained first as a child and adolescent psychotherapist at the Tavistock Clinic, London, and shortly thereafter as an adult psychoanalyst with the British Psychoanalytical Society. She was elected as a Distinguished Fellow in 2022.

### 28<sup>th</sup> November 2020

Our first CPD event was a part of a series called Core Concepts in Psychoanalysis. Senior Training and

Supervising Analyst Mr. Sarosh Forbes presented a paper on Transference and Projective Identification. The paper followed the development of these concepts from Freud to contemporary psychoanalytic understanding, helping to powerfully clarify and open up for us a complex and critical area of theory using clinical material and experience.

### **17<sup>th</sup> January 2021**

The next CPD event, also part of the Core Concepts in Psychoanalysis series, was conducted by Mrs. Minnie Dastur, who presented her paper 'From the Significance of Dreams to Dream Life' to elucidate how the very definition of dreams and understanding their hidden communications has changed from the pioneering works of Freud to more contemporary analysts.

#### 28<sup>th</sup> March 2021

Ms. Banu Ismail was the speaker at the third instalment of Core Concepts in Psychoanalysis. She presented her paper on Reflections on Narcissism from Freud to the present times. Her paper beautifully articulated the evolution of narcissism as it relates to psychoanalysis from Freud to contemporary analysts like Ms. Betty Joseph. Mrs. Zarine D'monte (Psychoanalyst and Child Analyst) was the Moderator and Discussant to the presentation.

### **14**<sup>th</sup> August **2021**

Ms. Gouri Salvi (Training Analyst, Psychoanalyst, and Child Analyst) presented her evocative paper on Mourning and Melancholia for the next CPD event, also under the Core Concepts in Psychoanalysis series. Ms. Micky Bhatia chaired the event. The paper used the poems of Sylvia Plath and Louise Gluck to differentiate between the two processes and the personalities they result in.

### **10<sup>th</sup> October 2021**

CPD also runs a series on Art and Psychoanalysis, the first of which was conducted by Ms. Anshu Jaiswal. Her presentation on the painting, 'The Lovers by Rene Margritte' used various vantage points to interpret the painting and was rich with psychoanalytical understanding. The presentation was chaired by Ms. Gouri Salvi.

### 9<sup>th</sup> April 2022

Ms. Nuzhat Khan was invited by the Otters Club to speak on how to deal with change post-Covid. The talk was attended by an enthusiastic gathering of about 60 people and addressed important concerns faced by them.

### 30<sup>th</sup> April 2022

This year saw our first collaboration with The Care Car. The Care Car is a group of four enterprising women, including Ms Micky Bhatia, who combine their passion for driving with raising funds for different NGOs.

Our first collaborative work was the Point of View Film Discussion. We started with the screening of a 13 minute film by Priyanka Banerjee - 'Devi' at The Royal Bombay Yacht Club. Ms. Nuzhat Khan gave a psychoanalytic view of the film which was followed by an invigorating discussion.

### 1<sup>st</sup> May 2022

The last CPD event of the year, part of the Art and Psychoanalysis series, saw joint participation of the three IPS centres in Delhi, Kolkata and Mumbai. Ms Bhavini Merchant-Dayal, made a presentation on David Bowie's 1969 hit song Space Oddity a pun on the title of the film "Space Odyssey". The event was chaired by Ms. Nuzhat Khan and the discussant was Mrs. Minnie Dastur. The presentation focused on the meaning of the lyrics, as related to Bowie's life and an understanding of such states of mind.

### 9<sup>th</sup> July 2022

The next Point of View Film Discussion by PTRC in collaboration with The Care Car was also at The Royal

Bombay Yacht Club. The movie screened and discussed was 'Aai Shapath'. Ms. Banu Ismail gave a psychoanalytic view of the film which was then opened to the public for discussion.

The event was preceded by the Convocation. Ms. Amrita Ganguly and Ms. Purvi Patel qualified as an Adult Psychoanalysts, and Ms. Abha Shah qualified as a Child Psychotherapist. We congratulate the three analysts on their successful journey.

### 16<sup>th</sup> July 2022

Dr. Nilofer Kaul (Training and Supervising Analyst, IPS – Delhi Chapter) held a discussion on her book Plato's Ghost. The talk was moderated by Ms. Micky Bhatia and was followed by a clinical case by Ms. Anshu Jaiswal.

### 6<sup>th</sup> August 2022

A CPD – Core Concepts in Psychoanalysis event On Beginning Treatment was run at the Bandra clinic. Mrs. Minnie Dastur presented a review of psychoanalytic practice and technique on beginning treatment from Freud to contemporary psychoanalytic thinking and practice. Two case presentations were given by Ms. Abha Shah and Ms. Yamini Namjoshi, followed by a discussion.

### 27<sup>th</sup> August 2022

The next CPD – Core Concepts in Psychoanalysis event was held at the Churchgate clinic on Understanding Narcissism, through a Psychoanalytic view of the film The Wife. Mrs. Zarine D'Monte presented an insightful paper on the film, followed by discussion.

### 17<sup>th</sup> September 2022

Ms. Purvi Patel presented her paper Bohemian Rhapsody by Freddie Mercury - A song about an ecstatic expression of feelings. The event, part of the CPD - Arts & Psychoanalysis series was held at the Churchgate clinic. Ms. Purvi Patel presented her indepth analysis of the lyrics and Freddie Mercury's history. Ms. Micky Bhatia was the discussant.

### 15<sup>th</sup> October 2022

The next CPD - Arts & Psychoanalysis event also at the Churchgate clinic, saw Ms. Shaili Shah present her paper The Bhagavad Gita from a Psychoanalytical lens. Ms. Anshu Jaiswal chaired the session and Ms. Sara Rouhzad was the discussant. The presentation was followed by an engaging and enriching discussion.

### 12<sup>th</sup> November 2022

The third film to be screened as part of Point of View Film Discussion was Everything is Fine. Ms. Micky Bhatia analysed the film. From the discussion that followed, it was clear that the screenings had succeeded in starting conversations around mental health. The event was organised at the Bombay Gymkhana.

### 26<sup>th</sup> November 2022

Ms. Nuzhat Khan presented her enlightening paper on The Death Instinct at the next CPD — Core Concepts in Psychoanalysis event, held at the Bandra clinic. Mr. Sarosh Forbes was the discussant and Ms. Banu Ismail chaired the event.

### **PTRC CLINICS**

The PTRC Clinics continue to offer both intensive and non-intensive, psychoanalytic psychotherapy for children and adults; short-term counselling in the form of Young Peoples' Counselling Service (YPCS); Infant Mental Health services (therapy for families with children under five); and Supportive Parent Work and Psychoeducational Assessments (for children).

Our clinics in Bandra and Horniman Circle are run under the Directorship of Ms. Banu Ismail. In February 2020 we added a new clinic in Churchgate, which is being run by Child Psychotherapist Ms. Manju Mukhi. She is the Coordinator of the clinic.

While some of the above work continues online, most is conducted in person. Over the last two years the clinics have treated over **500 patients** and have conducted over **20,000 sessions**.

The Horniman Circle Therapy Centre: The oldest clinic space, here our team of psychoanalysts and child psychotherapists continue to see children, parents and adults with emotional difficulties. This space also continues to house the PTRC library.

PTRC's Clinics at Bandra: Our team at the Bandra clinic continues to see patients in person. In January 2022 we witnessed an increase in the number of patients and so we expanded our clinic space from two to four clinic rooms.

PTRC Churchgate Clinic: Along with seeing patients in person at the newly opened and wonderfully designed Churchgate clinic, we have also used the space to hold a number of CPD events.

The 11 therapists who work across the PTRC clinic spaces are Ms. Banu Ismail, Ms. Manju Mukhi, Ms. Amrita Ganguly, Ms. Janice D'souza Barrett, Ms. Abha Shah, Ms. Yamini Namjoshi, Ms. Bhavini Merchant Dayal, Ms. Malika Ahmad, Ms. Manjari Keswani, Ms. Purvi Patel and Ms. Anshu Jaiswal.

### **SCHOOL WORK**

PTRC is currently working with three schools, viz., The Alexandra Girls English Institution, Sir Cawasjee Jehangir High School and Bai Bengalee Girls School. As always, we continue Parent Work, along with seeing the children.

When Covid hit in March 2020 the schools, the children, and the therapists all had to adjust to suddenly only being able to work online. Until then we took for granted a child's access to school, where they could learn, play and make friends, but now they had to stay at home with little to no social interaction. Given the circumstances, technology provided a much-needed way to stay in touch with the children and parents. Even though not everyone would have been able to make use of the online method it was important that the access was available if and when it was possible.

Working online came with its own set of challenges. Children were attending school online, they were entertaining themselves and playing online, and they were attending their therapy sessions online. This excessive dependence on and interaction with the internet, a very fast and mechanical medium, so different to an in-person experience, did and possibly continues to, impact children in quite adverse ways. Having to work with children in their homes brought up other issues such as a lack of space and privacy both physical and emotional, disruptions in the internet speed, all of which led to many children stopping their sessions after a while. Even those who continued, struggled with the new format.

The return back to school in February 2022, although very welcome on one level also brought up many anxieties and fears. Parents worried about the safety of children gathering in large numbers once again. The transition from the necessary isolation to feel safe, to a stage where students and teachers came together again, has been a difficult one and our therapists at the schools have been overwhelmed with a flood of new referrals, more than they are currently able to see.

Ms. Manju Mukhi, Child Psychotherapist, runs the PTRC's schools programme and has done so for the last 13 years. She saw not just the therapists, children and parents through this very difficult time, but was regularly called upon to support the school and teachers as well.

Currently four therapists work across the three schools PTRC is associated with. Ms. Manju Mukhi, Ms. Bhavini Merchant Dayal, Ms. Yamini Namjoshi, and Ms. Shaili Shah. Between them they conduct

around 370 sessions a month with children and parents. The schools they work with are all located in the South Mumbai area.

#### **OUTREACH**

### **Free Online Sessions During Covid**

In response to the pandemic and the extreme states of distress that people were being exposed to, and with a deep desire to contribute in some manner, PTRC launched Free Sessions via telephone in April 2020.



Our clinics had been receiving an overwhelming number of calls in a short space of time from March 2020 when the lockdown began. As a result of this programme 72 people were seen for free sessions, 10 of whom continue to be in therapy today.

### WORKSHOPS WITH EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS

Ms. Banu Ismail conducts regular workshops on understanding emotions, managing anxiety and depression. She conducted one such workshop with the students of Chetna college on Depression. She continues her work in short term therapy with secondary school teachers and parent counselling on a weekly basis.

Ms.Banu Ismail also conducts workshops with teachers, parents and children at Cardinal Gracias High School, Bandra. In the last one held in October 2022, she addressed the parents of Grade 10 students on the importance of mental health.

On 17<sup>th</sup> June 2020 Analyst Ms. Sara Rouhzad conducted a webinar on Introduction to Psychoanalysis & Observation and Clinical Training for the curious, graduating students of Jai Hind College. Ms. Sara Rouhzad has been giving these annual talks for the past many years and continued doing so during the COVID years. The aim of these talks is to give graduating students an idea of what a career in psychoanalysis looks like and includes a briefing about the training conducted by PTRC.

### **FUND RAISING**

On 19<sup>th</sup> January 2020, once again PTRC's well-wishers and members participated in the Mumbai Marathon to raise awareness about psychoanalysis and help raise funds. Their enthusiasm and commitment are greatly appreciated.

This year **Care Car**, which raises funds for different NGOs decided to partner with PTRC. As part of their initiative, Care Car members (including **Ms.Micky Bhatia**) undertook a journey, starting from Mumbai, to Bhuj. En route, they stopped at Baroda and conducted a talk with Prangan Education Trust. An NGO dedicated to the educational needs and support of children with disabilities and their families. They also conducted a talk on mental health at the Alembic Schools facilitated by the Inner WheelClub of Vadodara Udaan.

In Ahmedabad they addressed the parents of the children from the Rahe Khair school. The response was overwhelming and heartening. In Bhuj they addressed parents from the Little Steps Montessori school about mental health.

# PARTICIPATION BY THE MUMBAI CHAPTER (IPS) IN IPA (INTERNATIONAL PSYCHOANALYTIC ASSOCIATION) COMMITTEES

Over the years, the Mumbai Chapter's participation in IPA committees has been steadily increasing. Currently our representation on various committees is:

# Psychoanalytic Assistance in Crises and Emergencies Committee (PACE)

The Psychoanalytic Assistance in Crises and Emergencies Committee (PACE) of the IPA is a committee dedicated to assisting communities in crisis all around the world, be they natural or manmade. Drawing on IPA members and candidates interested in serving affected populations, PACE helps organise response teams employing psychoanalytic strategies of interventions in crisis or working as consultants to other organisations in contact with the affected community.

Ms. Banu Ismail represents the Asia Pacific Region of PACE. She has contributed to the creation of a bibliography containing articles, papers and news pertaining to trauma, crisis and emergencies. The bibliography is now available in the IPA webpage. (Link:

In November and December of 2022, Ms Banu Ismail co-conducted weekly Work Discussion Seminars along with Ms. Gianna Williams from London, for Ukrainian therapists working with patients who are suffering the consequences of war. The participants have greatly benefitted from the seminars and the weekly seminars continue from mid-January 2023.

#### **IPA Committee on Education**

Psychoanalysis has been a great influence in education and is well-placed to engage in interdisciplinary collaborations with specialists, teachers, educational workers, etc., to face the various problems that the learning process can present to both the student and the educator.

Contact with the educational field allows psychoanalysts to intervene directly when young people present their first symptoms. In addition, psychoanalysts can help educators prepare to use psychoanalytic tools in their work with young people.

As a result of these stated aims, the IPA was very keen for India to be a part of this committee particularly to know about the experience of working in schools and with children and parents from deprived socioeconomic circumstances.

Mrs. Minnie Dastur was invited by the IPA - Committee on Education to input on India's experience (as part of Developing Countries), of working psychoanalytically in the field of education.Ms. Manju Mukhi was included in a further meeting to get the picture from a 'hands-on' point of view. The Committee pledged its support to our work.

### **COWAP**

The COWAP was founded in 1998 as part of the International Psychoanalytic Association (IPA), to study psychoanalysis, sexuality, and gender. Ms. Micky Bhatia is the Mumbai Chapter's representative on COWAP. The other committee members are Ms. Amrita Narayanan (Goa), Ms. Neetu Sarin (Delhi), Ms. Urvashi Pawar (Delhi), and Ms. Jhuma Basak (Kolkata).

### IPA Inter-Committee on Prejudices and Racism

Ms. Nuzhat Khan is part of the IPA committee on Prejudices, Discrimination and Racism. The committee is committed to studying the existence of structural racism in our organizations. Ms. Khan has been asked to work with the Committee as part of a second circle of colleagues providing inputs.

### **Work with China**

Mrs. Minnie Dastur continues to be a member of the IPA-China Committee. She is also a Training and Supervisory Analyst on the same, conducting analysis, supervision and teaching. In addition, she supervises and teaches one large group and two smaller groups of Chinese psychodynamic psychotherapists.

### **APPC Programme Committee**

Mrs. Minnie Dastur was on the Programme Committee of the IPA's Asia-Pacific Psychoanalytic Conference 2023 held in Delhi. As part of her responsibilities she was one of the speakers at an IPA webinar held on 25th November 2022. Her talk put the Conference theme of "Containing Diversity: Bridging Difference" within the cultural context of India and the Asia Pacific region, and with a very clear psychoanalytic understanding.

### CONFERENCES

The Committee on Woman and Psychoanalysis (COWAP) held a conference in Delhi on the 3<sup>rd</sup> of January on Queerness, Women and Psychoanalysis.

The Jan 3<sup>rd</sup> conference on queerness in all its dimensions was organized by COWAP's Asia-Pacific chapter. Experienced psychoanalysts and newer therapists spoke about their experience of queerness in the clinic, while internationally acclaimed academicians spoke about queerness in language and on sexuality beyond consent. A short film, Sheer Qorma, was screened and discussed with the filmmaker.

The IPA Asia Pacific Conference 2023 was held in Delhi from the 4<sup>th</sup> to the 6<sup>th</sup> of January. Many analysts and candidates from the Mumbai Chapter attended the conference and interacted with members of IPA from around the globe.

The conference was successful on several different levels. It was well attended by the Asian countries Taiwan, Korea, Japan, Israel, Australia and India with China being present online. It created a space for us to come together to understand our unique and shared ways of working, helping us make enduring connections across the region and the world. Other countries that attended included France, Germany, America, England, Italy and many more. The three days were packed with a main lecture, followed by a discussion. The second half of the day started with individual papers sessions, clinical groups and ended with 'Being Together in Delhi' (BTD) groups.

Mrs. Minnie Dastur was a discussant for Ms. Fang Fang's paper on Working with the 'Other' in Couple Relationships. She also chaired Thursday's Keynote lecture, and the discussion that followed, in which both Mr. Naoki Fujiyama and Ms. Tsung-Wei Hsu presented two very engaging papers.

## Francis Tustin International Conference in Mumbai, September 2024

The 9th Frances Tustin International Conference will take place in Mumbai between September 19th -September 22nd, 2024. This prestigious international conference has previously been held in Warsaw, Tel-Aviv, Sydney and Boston and now comes to Mumbai, as a joint project of The Frances Tustin Memorial Trust and the Mumbai Chapter, IPS. The Conference's theme is Following Early Ruptures. The conference will host leading lecturers and supervisors from various countries, all experts in primitive mental states, in general, and autistic defences and disorders, in particular. The conference will enable us to deepen our theoretical and clinical understanding of developmental ruptures and their further evolution that are relevant to professionals working with both adults and children.

### **NEW DEVELOPMENTS**

### **Clinical Dialogues**

In July 2022, the three chapters of the Indian Psychoanalytic Society (IPS) came together for a new initiative - Clinical Dialogues. The objective of this undertaking, initiated by Senior Training and Supervising Analyst, Mr. Sarosh Forbes, was to bring the three chapters (Kolkata, Delhi and Mumbai) closer together, and to have a better understanding of each other's work, through clinical presentations.

The presentations are being done on a rotational basis, starting with Kolkata, followed by Delhi and then Mumbai. Clinical Dialogues are held once every three months, on the last Saturday of that month, at 4:00 pm. Ms. Banu Ismail and Ms. Gouri Salvi head the Mumbai Committee for Clinical Dialogues.

Ms. Purvi Patel was the first presenter from Mumbai. She presented her clinical work, which was followed by a discussion. Our clinical students are invited to share their work, as the programme continues.

## Creation of the COFAP – Committee on Couples and Family Psychoanalysis

Mrs. Minnie Dastur represents the Asia Pacific region on the recently formed COFAP. The focus of this committee is on psychotherapy with couples and the family as the place where life starts.

On 5th January several IPA members and candidates, including members of the Mumbai Chapter, attended the initial meeting held in Delhi. The need to bring work with couples and families into the mainstream of psychoanalytic training was highlighted. Just as we train to be child or adult analysts, the hope is to have training for couples and family work as well. It was announced that a pilot programme for such a training will begin in Mumbai from 2024.

A home that I cannot go back to.


### Drop

Yo-Yo Ma is not just known as a world-renowned cellist, but also as a figure that brings people together through music, embodying the belief that "the pathway to a better world begins with culture"<sup>1</sup>.

Recently, I came across a podcast where he shared the journey about creating The Silk Road Project. In this episode, Yo-Yo Ma describes the conception and execution of his idea to bring together musicians and instruments from countries along the Silk Route that all had common roots but were never played together. He expressed this as, "If I know something that's really precious to you and you know something that's really precious to me, they don't have to be the same thing. We start off having a much better conversation"<sup>2</sup>. It was the expression of a desire to appreciate differences, put them in the same space and find a shared language that might emerge as a result.

In this podcast, there were several moments where I felt that the Silk Road Project had parallels to our work in the consulting room and psychoanalytic thinking in general. I also cannot help but connect this work on bridging differences through culture, with the theme of our IPA Asia Pacific Conference.
